ANAPHYLAXIS LEVEL 3

FAA LEVEL 3 AWARD IN IMMEDIATE MANAGEMENT OF ANAPHYLAXIS (RQF)

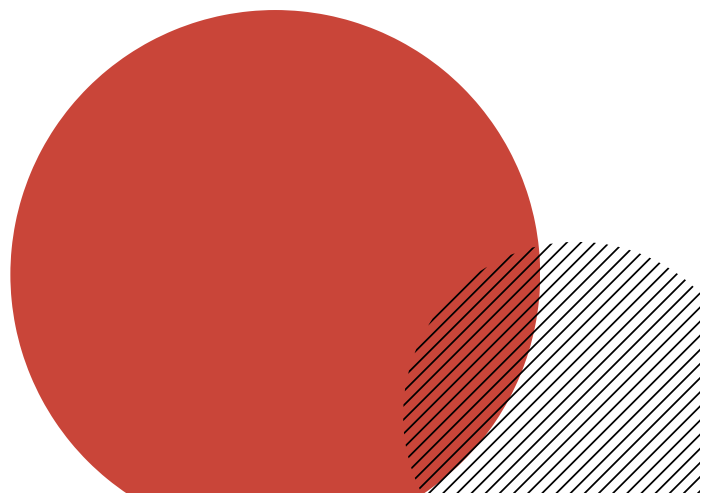
Anaphylaxis is a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction that can develop rapidly and this qualification provides the knowledge and skills to promptly recognise and manage a casualty with anaphylaxis until emergency medical assistance arrives.

Entry Requirements The qualification is available to learners aged 16 or over. It is recommended that learners hold a minimum of level 1 in literacy or equivalent to undertake this qualification. Due to practical elements of this course Learners will need to be able to perform CPR on the floor.

Qualification Delivery The qualification has 6 assigned guided learning hours (GLH). GLH indicates the number of contact hours that the learner will undertake being taught or assessed under the immediate guidance or supervision of the trainer/assessor in the classroom. The minimum classroom contact time of 6 hours can be delivered in a day or can be completed over a maximum of 3 weeks ensuring that each session is a minimum of two hours. The learner ratio for the qualification is a maximum of 12 learners to 1 trainer/assessor

Certification The qualification is valid for three years from the date of achievement. It is strongly recommended by the Health and Safety Executive that the learner attends annual refresher training.

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Syllabus The course is made up of practical and theoretical sessions delivered by your Instructor who will provide a detailed course programme. At the end of the course, learners will be able to:

- Describe anaphylaxis
- Identify triggers for anaphylaxis
- Describe life threatening problems associated with the:
 - Airway • Breathing • Circulation • Disability (Neurological status) • Exposure (Skin and mucosal changes)
- Identify key features of adrenaline–auto injectors
- Conduct an initial assessment using the ABCDE approach
- Demonstrate a recovery position
- Demonstrate resuscitation for adult and/or child
- Recognise the need to use an auto-injector
- Prepare medication for administration during anaphylaxis treatment
- Demonstrate the safe use of an adrenaline auto-injector using a training device
- Safely dispose of sharps according to agreed ways of working
- Handover the casualty to a medical professional
